Rift In BKD-Congress Coalition Complete

P.M. Resents Charges Against Partymen

TALKS WITH CHARAN SINGH

LUCKNOW, Wednesday.
THE Congress-BKD coalition Government in Uttar Pradesh has virtually come to an end after the Chief Minister, Mr. Charan Singh's parleys with Prime Minister Indira Gandhi this evening.

Mr. Charan Singh announced to press men late tonight that both the partners in the coalition had decided to part company.

The Chief Minister, it is accused Mr. H. N. Bahuguna, A-ICC general secretary, accused Mr. H. N. Bahuguna, A-ICC general secretary, Mr. Uma Shankar Dikshit, a member of the Congress Working Committee and Mr. Yashpal Kapoor, principal private secretary to the Prime Minister, for their attempt to "subvert the loyalty of BKD members", even when the Prime Minister was in town. This accusation was strongly resented by Mrs. Gandhi and the BKD leader ended the talks in a huff.

After getting a hint of the heat from the Congress-O.P.U. the Jan Sangh leaders here decided to act like good Samaritans and help Mr. Charan Singh. Their objective is not to give the Congress a chance to invite the Congress for the formation of a new government.

CM's Lament

Mr. Charan Singh was asked his opinion on the outcome of his interview talks with Prime Minister Indira Gandhi at Lucknow. At first, the chief minister had refused to talk to press men after his meeting with the Prime Minister at 7-30 p.m. but, he agreed to say something when he had had conversation for nine hours with eleven of his colleagues at his residence. Mr. Singh would not tell what talks he had with the Prime Minister but it was learnt that he

said that the final decision of his party would be taken before October 5 (the Assembly is scheduled to meet on October 6).

In reply to a question, Mr. Singh said that he had intended to go with the Prime Minister tomorrow on her flood tour but would not be able to do so on account of urgent work. The Revenue Minister, Mr. Shripal Misra, would accompany the Prime Minister.

The eleven persons with whom Mr. Charan Singh held consultations tonight included ministers Jai Ram Verma, Shekhar Singh, Shripal Misra, Biswanath Dasgupta, Singh, Virender Verma and state B.K.D. general secretary Satyendra Singh, secretary Raj Bhaduri, Devender and Shivamal Yadav MP.

Elaborating his charge, he said that Mr. Arun Shastri Dikshit, a member of the Congress Working Committee, and Mr. Kisan Kapoor, principal private secretary to the Prime Minister, had today "ousted" Mr. Sheo Nath Singh, a former B.K.D. MLA, with a view to tempting him to defect to the Congress. They were vainly trying for a meeting of Mr. Sheo Nath Singh with the Prime Minister.

Mr. Charan Singh disclosed that Mr. Sheo Nath Singh, who had formed an independent group and decided to return to the B.K.D. with his other MLAs who had left the party, Mr. Sheo Nath Singh and Mr. Dikshit that his group's quarrel with the B.K.D. was an internal matter.

Mr. Charan Singh said that this attempt by Mr. Dikshit and Mr. Kapoor to tempt defection by B.K.D. ranks had pained him and his party. We cannot do anything on the part of the Congress to worsen the present situation. We consider it a calamity, a culmination," he added.

A pressman asked, Does this mean there is now no possibility of a rapprochement?

Mr. Singh replied, "They have closed their door. The implications are not yet upon us. We feel that Mr. Dikshit and Mr. Kapoor contacted our supporters with the implied permission of the Prime Minister. This poses a great danger to the Indian democracy, particularly when the Prime Minister's party had introduced a bill prohibiting or regulating defections. The bill is pending before the Lok Sabha."

The second in the B.K.D. which favoured continuance of the present coalition and pleaded for a rapprochement with the Congress got a rude shock of the incident and looked dismayed and decided to drop any such attempt.

The SSP leaders who met Mr. C. B. Gupta earlier today also, met state Jan Sangh general secretary Mr. Ram Prakash and discussed the political situation and agreed to maintain a stand-

Mrs. Gandhi is understood to have heard from her party leaders the latest political situation in the state.

They were also stated to have reviewed steps taken by the state Congress leadership to meet the crisis in the B.K.D. coalition Government and the strategy to be evolved on the eve of the ensuing assembly session.

Meaningful Smile

Earlier, Mr. Charan Singh and Mr. Kamlapati Tripathi found a few moments together under the shade of a helicopter for a warm shake-hand and exchange pleasantries.

They stole these few moments when Prime Minister Indira Gandhi was virtually mobbed by enthusiastic crowd who profusely gat-handed her by breaking the police cordon at the Amritsar airport tarmac here.

Mr. Charan Singh first carried Miss Gandhi alone with Governor B. Govind Reddy within from the garland-welcoming crowd and went near the shade of the helicopter where he found smiling Mr. Tripathi.

Amid hand-shaking Mr. Charan Singh asked Mr. Tripathi who was accompanying Mrs. Gandhi in her aerial tour "Did you go to all places?"



With the other MLAs who had left the party, Mr. Steonach Singh had told Mr. Dikshit that his group's quarrel with the BKD was an internal matter.

To persistent questions by newsmen, "Mr. Charan" Singh retorted, "go and ask the Prime Minister!"

Mr. Charan Singh, however, avoided politics with fury, but he yielded to some of the pressmen after his merruous remark in response:

"The meeting between Mr. Charan Singh and Mrs. Gandhi took place at approximately 11 AM. It is a confidential discussion between the Prime Minister and the Chief Minister. I am not privy to the details."
